a safe place to call home

sandy johnson

Sandy Johnson and her 8-year-old daughter currently live in an outdated apartment building in South Moorhead. There's black mold and many updates need to be done to the building. Until recently, the entry to the building was not secure and anyone could walk in and up the stairs. The apartment isn't the safe and comfortable home Sandy envisioned her daughter growing up in. They make do, but can't wait for the safety their new home will provide.

Sandy first heard about Habitat in 2015 when her niece was chosen to partner with Douglas County Habitat. She spoke highly of the process and encouraged Sandy to turn in an application. Sandy decided to apply in July of 2017 but did not have high expectations, "I didn't think it was for me."

"The call from Jackie at Habitat came at the perfect time." Sandy's daughter had been in the hospital with a blood infection — a time that was scary, difficult, and stressful for the family. A breath of relief, dreams of family celebrations, and the memories that Sandy and her daughter would be making in their very own home quickly set in. Her daughter's first question was "will you build me a treehouse?" She can't wait to begin working on her house (and eventually a treehouse!)

Sandy has been very involved in the whole process, especially the sweat-equity requirement for all Habitat homeowners and believes it makes the experience more meaningful. "I'll love my home even more because I got to help build it with my own hands"

Since being chosen, Sandy has met multiple people who have partnered with Habitat, "once I found one person who'd been blessed, I found more and more who had been through this process or know someone who has."

Sandy and her daughter are very thankful for being chosen to partner with Habitat, and would like to thank everyone for their time, donations, and support. They look forward to staying connected with Habitat and giving back to the community and future families because Habitat helps transform families like hers.







Even after being involved in more than 40 builds, Becky Boyle Jones still feels a tug at her heartstrings when she sees a family receive their keys to their Habitat for Humanity home.

It's the smallest details that really get to her. It's the family that can get a puppy because they now have a yard. It's the little girl who is thrilled to pick a color to paint her bedroom for the first time.



"To watch little kids run around and to know that they now have a safe place to come home to," Becky says. "That's a big deal." Becky and her husband, Robert, have volunteered with Habitat for Humanity for years. In addition to serving as volunteers, Becky has served for six years on the Board of Directors; Robert served for five.

"It's a challenge and an opportunity to learn," Robert says. "But when you get to know and work with the families, you see the impact you can make."

Both Becky and Robert were raised in families that valued service. Both also became educators – Becky works in student life at Minnesota State University Moorhead; Robert is at The Village as a trainer. They believe deeply in giving people a hand up to improve their lives.

During their years with Habitat, they've seen the unsafe and unkempt homes where families live because they have no other choice. They've seen closets used as bedrooms and babies sleeping near drafty windows. They've seen families use ovens to heat cold homes and walls covered with mold.

"It doesn't make sense to me that in a community this affluent, there are people still living in destitute conditions," Becky says.

So, she and Robert focus on what they can do. Becky is part of the selection committee that chooses the two to three families each year who are eligible for a Habitat home in Cass and Clay counties.

Being a part of this process gives her a front row view into the successes: the family member with disabilities who can function in a new, accessible home, the kids who now feel comfortable inviting friends over after school.

The couple also counts the unexpected successes. Habitat's application is extensive and includes mandatory financial counseling and mentoring. One family applied for two years and didn't get chosen. But thanks to Habitat's support, they cleaned up their credit and were able to qualify for a traditional mortgage.

It's the partnerships between volunteers, community members, and the Habitat family that bring vibrancy to the program. The Jones's have seen how Habitat homes are a long-term investment in both neighborhoods and families.

When people have stable housing, their children are more likely to graduate high school. With affordable housing, they can pay for other needs like school supplies.

Any time Becky and Robert see the keys being handed over to a family, it's a good day.

"I wish we could do 10 builds a year," Becky says.

What drove you to work for Habitat?

What drove you to work for Habitat?

When you align your vocation with your values, it unlocks the potential for great things to happen. I joined Lake Agassiz Habitat in late October of 2018 after making the decision to move away from corporate work and move toward a more purposeful workplace. My first nine months at Habitat have provided me with a very rewarding experience. We've held 2 home dedication ceremonies, from the 2017 build season, and two wall raising ceremonies so far this summer. What I find most rewarding is working with Partner Families and realizing the transformative impact that the Habitat program will have on their lives.

We're in the middle of the 2018 build season now and we have three homes planned this year. The first home, in West Fargo, is nearing completion and we've just begun framing on the second home, in North Fargo. The third home in Dilworth will begin in late August, and all three homes are targeted for completion by Thanksgiving. Each of the Partner Families this year are single mothers and they've each exemplified the term 'partner' through their high level of involvement with Habitat as they work to meet our 250 hour sweat equity requirement of each adult family member.

My goal for this year is to set a trajectory to grow our production level to serve more local families. Last year we built two homes and this year we're building three homes. Next year we plan to build at least four homes but we can't do this without your help. We need to create new energy and new excitement about our mission and about the good work that Habitat does in our community. Unfortunately, the demand in our community for affordable homes is far greater than our ability to build them. We've planned a Blitz Home Build project in June 2019 where we will build three homes in 10 days. This is just one example of new energy and excitement about our mission. We're planning to add Habitat crew leaders and ReStore crew leaders to help us reach our growth goals. 

HOW MANY PEOPLE ARE HUNGRY

Habitat Minnesota reports there is at least a 15% point reduction in every type of government assistance program used except for disability, which is expected to remain the same after families move into their Habitat home.

NUMBER OF HOMELESS YOUTH / FAMILIES

A study done in 2015 by the FM Coalition for the Homeless, counted 591 homeless in Fargo and Moorhead. Nearly 30% are one paycheck away from being homeless.



HOW MANY PEOPLE LIVE IN POVERTY

In Moorhead,14.9% of the population is at or below the poverty line. In Fargo, the percentage is similar at 14.6%.
